Course Description

3 credit course – A discussion of the fundamental engineering and medical principles of the acquisition, measurement, and processing of physiological signals from living systems with a focus on the human body. Students are introduced to operational amplifiers (op-amps) and their circuit configurations that allow signal processing, conditioning, amplification, and spectral filtering signals as relevant to biomedical devices. An early christmas present is hidden in this syllabus; continue reading to find it and earn a prize. The basics of biosensors (transducers) and bioelectrodes for the measurement of motion, biopotentials, pressure, and temperature are explored in Biomedical Engineering-specific applications like photoplethysmography (PPG), electrocardiography (EKG), electrophoresis, and electronic stethoscopes.

MAC 2313, MAP 2302, PHY 2049, and EEL 3003 with minimum grades of C. *Now is a good time to review the material of those courses!*

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to:

- Identify the basic building blocks of a biomedical instrument/measuring device.
- Design operational amplifier circuits to meet specific design requirements.
- Analyze the functionality and performance of the used circuit designs.
- Understand the underlying bio-physical principle of biosensors and bioelectrodes.
- Characterize bio-sensor properties.
- Recognize discussed concepts and theories in commercial medical devices.

<u>Class format:</u> The class is in person and will follow a classic lecture-based format using PowerPoint slides and in-class activities and discussions.

<u>Supplemental reading material:</u> Supplemental material will be provided by the instructor and posted to Canvas. All material posted to Canvas is exam and homework-relevant unless otherwise noted by the instructor.

<u>Homework:</u> Homework will be assigned on Canvas and is always due at midnight. Get an early start on your homework using the preview pdf to help you keep the structure of your learning experience. The hUnT continues. Keep going for more info. *Homework submissions within 48 hours of the deadline will be allowed* **80%** *of the full points. Submissions received 48 hours past the deadline will be allowed* **50%** *of the full points.* The homework grade is the average of two untimed attempts. Submission integrity (correct file, file extension, and format) is the responsibility of the student when a file upload is required. Always view your submission after you submit it.

<u>Lecture Quizzes:</u> lecture quizzes will be assigned on Canvas after class and are open for one week. *Late submissions will not be considered*. The lecture quiz grade is the average of two timed attempts.
